Definition of and Best Practices for K-12 Service Learning

Definition of Service-Learning, from U.S. statute:

The term "service-learning" means a method—

- (A) under which students or participants learn and develop through active participation in thoughtfully organized service that—
 - (i) is conducted in and meets the needs of a community;
 - (ii) is coordinated with an elementary school, secondary school, institution of higher education, or community service program, and with the community; and
 - (iii) helps foster civic responsibility; and
- (B) that—
 - (i) is integrated into and enhances the academic curriculum of the students, or the educational components of the community service program in which the participants are enrolled; and
 - (ii) provides structured time for the students or participants to reflect on the service experience. (42 USC § 12511(40))

Stages/Steps of Service-Learning:

- Stage 1: Identify sought youth outcomes—academic, social, work skills, civic, life skills—and design activities that have participants apply knowledge and skills in the selected outcome
- Stage 2: Determine evidence and methods to measure outcomes formative and summative assessment
- Stage 3: Employ the '<u>IPARD</u>' model for student activities and roles:
 - 1. Investigation: Identify and learn about issues and needs in the community.
 - 2. Planning: Work with partners and other stakeholders to design service to address identified need(s).
 - 3. Action: Meaningful service that applies knowledge, skills, behaviors, and habits of citizenship.
 - 4. Reflection: Activity at all stages of the project to consider issues, impacts, levels of learning, outcomes, next steps, thoughts, feelings, and experiences.
 - 5. Demonstration: Show/present to/teach others about the project and what has been learned and accomplished. Also represents another level of service-learning action.

Service-Learning Best Practices from the National Commission on Military, National, and Public Service

This President-appointed Commission encourages organizations to support K–12 service-learning by implementing the following:

- Ensure curricular standards or frameworks contain robust guidelines for service learning, by implementing recognized best practices.
- Integrate service-learning methodologies into K–12 classrooms, including by providing appropriate training to teachers of all subjects.
- Encourage and facilitate extracurricular activities and programs focused on civic responsibility and community service.
- Support teachers who build service-learning opportunities into their regular curricula.
- Commit funds to support service-learning.
- Collaborate with other educational agencies and nonprofits to develop model standards or frameworks for service learning.
- Collaborate with philanthropic, corporate, and nonprofit entities to support service-learning.
- Develop scholarship programs for students to participate in service-learning projects.
- Create a recognition program for schools, teachers, and students who perform exceptionally in service-learning projects.
- Allow students to obtain course credit for service-learning activities in excess of what the state or local education authority already requires.
