The Building Opportunities in Out-of-School Time (BOOST) Grants Program



In 2021, the Georgia Department of Education partnered with the Georgia Statewide Afterschool Network (GSAN) to develop the Building Opportunities in Out-of-School Time (BOOST) grants program, funded through the American Rescue Plan Act Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund. BOOST was designed to distribute approximately \$85 million over three years to expand access to and improve the quality of summer enrichment opportunities and comprehensive afterschool programming for K-12 youth across Georgia.


BOOST grants support youth's academic acceleration, connectedness and well-being, utilizing a whole child approach to:













Most Frequently Reported Implementation Successes










Priority Youth Populations Served

Youth Outcomes

With guidance from evaluation experts, grantees established 3 key outcomes across four service areas. Nearly all grantees met or exceeded at one of their outcome during the academic year (93%) and summer (99%).



Grantee Spotlight (Academic Assessment)

"iReady diagnostic results along with grade reports allow teachers to establish collaborative groups to focus on reading and math...The data results show an 80% success rate with 170 students out of the target number of 213 on track to make an increase by one grade level in their academic performance." – Augusta Richmond County Juvenile Court

Infrastructure and Sustainability

Stakeholder interviews indicated that BOOST was viewed as a positive force in enhancing that state's broader out-of-school time (OST) programming infrastructure, particularly through sustainable public-private partnerships and cross-sector collaboration. Grantee case studies also highlighted that the BOOST program elevated the quality and depth of Georgia's OST programming. Stakeholders agreed that BOOST (or a comparable form of support) should continue to support OST programs for Georgia's youth.

"I think the value added of

through a combination of a partnership with the
